We are honoured to have some renowned international contributors. Prevention and early detection are very much at the forefront of improving cancer outcomes, and Professor Anthony Howell starts us off with an important session addressing the influence of diet and exercise, followed by a look at the effects of diversity in the North East, and key messages from screening. There is a much needed session on gynaecomastia, and Dr Daniel Rea will be telling us about the impact of the TEAM study on hormonal therapies. Other prominent experts from across the UK will be addressing hot topics throughout the conference.

I look forward to seeing you and trust you will find this a valuable opportunity to meet and share ideas with colleagues in all disciplines, from home and abroad. Please feed back to us and share any thoughts you have for future conferences. Thank you for your participation, and have a good time!

Dr Krishna B Clough



Dr Krishna B Clough is a surgical oncologist and a plastic surgeon, specialized in breast surgery.

He graduated in general surgery and in surgical oncology, but also in plastic, cosmetic, and reconstructive surgery. After completing his surgical training in France (Paris University) and in the United States (Columbia University, New York, and

Emory University Atlanta), Dr Clough joined the most famous French hospital for breast cancer treatment (the Curie Institute) in 1990. In 1996, he was appointed Chief of the Department of General and Breast Surgery of the Curie Institute, where he published numerous clinical and research papers on breast cancer and breast surgery. He decided to resign from his hospital functions in 2004 to found the Paris Breast Centre - L'Institut Du Sein, the first centre in France dedicated exclusively to breast surgery and breast cancer.

Meanwhile, he kept on his clinical research and teaching: he, along with a small group of European surgeons, created the concept of "Oncoplastic surgery" (the use of sophisticated plastic surgery techniques to extend surgical possibilities for breast conservation and reduce post operative sequellae). Fully integrated into a

multidisciplinary treatment, the concept of oncoplastic surgery is now spreading worldwide in the field of breast oncology, as it is considered as one of the main recent advances in breast cancer surgery.

Dr Clough is a member of the board of directors of the French Society of Breast Disease. He is also a member of the French Societies of oncology, and plastic, reconstructive, and cosmetic surgery. He is one of the founding members of Breast Surgery international and a member of the European Society of Mastology.

Dr Clough has represented France in numerous international working groups (consensus conferences), whose works have been the object of reference publications. He is the founder and director of the breast surgery masterclass at the European School of Surgery (Paris), and is the co-chairman of the breast surgical course at the European Institute of Oncology (Milan).

He has published over 120 scientific articles on breast surgery and the treatment of cancer in international scientific journals. As such, he is constantly invited to give lectures and presentations in numerous countries. He has authored several chapters in teaching books and a book for patients about breast cancer (Breast Cancer, Editions Marabout, Paris).

Dr Vani Parmer



Dr Vani Parmar graduated from Lady Hardinge Medical College, New Delhi, India in 1986 followed by general surgical training from 1988-1990 at Safdarjung Hospital, New Delhi. After completing her Fellowship in Breast Surgical Oncology (1999-2002) she joined the Tata Memorial Hospital, Mumbai as faculty, where she is currently serving as an Associate Professor

and Consultant Breast Surgeon in Department of Surgical Oncology.

Dr Parmar is primarily interested in oncoplastic breast surgery in early breast cancers and volume replacement LD flap for extended indications of breast conservation in both large operable and locally advanced cancers. Apart from being a principal investigator in various investigator initiated and collaborative research group trials, her main areas of interests are in sentinel node biopsy in early breast cancer and after neo-adjuvant chemotherapy; disseminated tumour cells in bone marrow and circulation; breast cancer in young women & quality of life issues; and neo-adjuvant intervention studies in locally advanced breast cancer.

She is a member of the International Breast Cancer Study Group (IBCSG), Asian Breast Cancer Study Group and the Indian Breast Group (IBG) and a board member of the Women's Cancer Initiative – Tata Memorial Hospital, an NGO based in Mumbai. Dr Parmar is also an active member of the committee formed by ICMR (Indian Council of Medical Research) for evolving management guidelines for breast cancer treatment in India. She has contributed numerous articles to medical journals and chapters on breast cancer in text books for postgraduate education and serves on the editorial board of various medical journals.

Dr André Robidoux



Dr André Robidoux is currently Professor Surgery (tenure) of Scotia Chair and in diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer at the University Montreal. of Dr Robidoux is a graduate

of the University of Montreal where he received both the Baccalaureate of Arts and Doctor of Medicine degrees. He completed his post-graduate training in Surgery in Montreal and in the Department of Developmental Therapeutics at MD Anderson Cancer Centre, University of Texas in Houston. He is an elected member of the Board of Directors of the National Surgical Adjuvant Breast Project (NSABP). He served on the Board of the Canadian Breast Cancer Research Alliance Research Advisory Committee and on Council of the Royal College of Physicians of Canada. He also served on the steering committees of the Breast Cancer Prevention Trial and the STAR trial. Dr Robidoux has also served on numerous NSABP committees including the executive committee and the quality assurance committee. His research activities have been supported by continuous competitive renewal grants from the National Health Institutes and the National Cancer Institute for the last 28 years. He also received grant support from Canadian Breast Cancer Research Alliance and Canadian Institutes of Health Research.

Prof Emiel Rutgers



Prof Dr Rutgers is a Surgical Oncologist at the Netherlands Cancer Institute in Amsterdam, Netherlands, Head of the Department of Surgery and Chair of the Institute's Breast Cancer Working Group. After earning a medical degree from the State University of Utrecht in the Netherlands, he completed his residency training in internal medicine at Sint Antonius

Ziekenhuis, Utrecht, and his general surgery training at the St. Joseph-Ziekenhuis in Eindhoven. Prof Rutgers is currently Secretary General of the EORTC, fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons (London & Glasgow); treasurer and past-chair of the European Organization for Research and Treatment of Cancer (EORTC) Breast Group; and chair of the National Dutch Working Group for the guidelines on screening, diagnosis, and treatment of breast cancer. He is a member of several societies including the European Society of Surgical Oncology, Society of Surgical Oncology (United States), American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO), and of the Executive Committee of the European Society of Mastology. He was Chair of the European Breast Cancer conference in Berlin April 2008.

Prof Rutgers' main fields of interest is breast cancer, with emphasis on prognostic and predictive factors (microarray techniques), risk management and prevention, and optimalisation of surgical procedures including neoadjuvant chemotherapy, sentinel node procedure and immediate breast reconstruction. He is on the editorial board of the European Journal of Surgical Oncology and the author or co-author of more than 250 articles, abstracts, and book chapters on different aspects of breast cancer. Prof Rutgers is the principal investigator of the EORTC-AMAROS Trial (in sentinel node biopsy in breast cancer) and the EORTC MINDACT Trial, which is studying the value the 70-gene micro-array Mammaprint test in node negative and positive breast cancer.


Please enter the museum by the City Entrance. There is free parking available at the main Museum car park off Leeman Road.
